Sports Premium Funding 2022 - 2023

The school has been in receipt of additional government funding specified as 'Sport Premium' since its introduction in September 2013. As a school we will be held accountable for how we have used the additional funding and from April 2014 we are required to publish online information regarding how we have used the Sport's Premium and the impact it has made. To meet this requirement the following information has been produced which sets out the amount of Sport Premium we will receive and how we intend to use it. Bevendean Primary School and Nursery will receive the total of £18,579 for 2022 - 2023.

- 7/12 of the funding (£18,579) will be received by the school on 30 October 2022 £10,838
- 5/12 of the funding (£18,579) will be received by the school on 30 April 2023 £7,741
- In addition, the school has £11,527 carry-forward of Sports Premium funding from 2021 2022. £8,305 has already been committed to the redevelopment of the Pencil Playground, leaving £3,222.

This gives us a total of £21,801 (£18,579 + £3,222).

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport you offer.

The 5 key indicators that we would expect to see an improvement in are:

- the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- increased participation in competitive sport
